Everyone	M	Injury – cuts bruising, breaks and sprains	Warning delivered in safety brief that fire doors are particularly heavy. Residents to wear indoor shoes and slippers at all times, covered in safety brief. Group leaders to instruct groups to remain in their rooms during the night unless they need the toilet or there is an emergency. Groups to be shown where their nearest toilet is to negate the need for going into unfamiliar areas. Ensure that all finger guards fitted on each hinge side of door are kept in place.

Wires kept away from thoroughfares Electrical cables to run through rubber floor tracking to prevent tripping. Groups advised not to use un tested appliances in safety brief. Pat testing is undertaken by reputable external company with in- house qualified maintenance team undertaking on-going observations.

Leaders to ensure that external gates are observed when children are in the garden. Leaders to advise children not to leave the garden. If a stranger should wander into the grounds leaders to escort them off the premises or ask a member of staff between 8:00 – 20:00 and Warden 20:00 – 8:00 to deal with this. Every visitor to the Centre who is NOT included on the fire register is signed in and badged by the office staff. Groups are informed of any on-site maintenance with external contractors during their stay by office staff.
